A PATHWAY OF FAITH TO FOLLOW

I threw on a t-shirt, shorts, and some running shoes this morning to run. It was a last minute decision, one brought on by the urging of a friend who was participating in a race and desired a running mate.

I obliged and joined her at the start line, waiting for the race to begin.

For some, the shotgun start incites an intoxicating rush of adrenaline, a blur of energy and release. For others, a distinct pang of nervousness, a muddled mess of awkward limbs.

Regardless, eventually – hopefully – we begin to find our stride.

Maybe it's because the nerves subside.
Maybe it's because the limbs straighten out.

Or maybe it's because those we know – and those we have never met before – begin to cheer us forward.

I thought about our executive director, Nella, this morning as I ran, weaving through streets lined with red, pink, purple, and orange tulips, just beginning to come alive.

I thought about her unexpected passing.
I thought about her life.
I thought about her ministry.

I thought about her authenticity and strength, her fiery spirit and her joyful passion.

The writer of Hebrews likens the life of faith to an athlete running a race. Each of us is running. Perhaps we're running bursting with energy - confident, encouraged, and excited. Perhaps we're running burdened by fear - weary, drained, and downcast.

But we're all running, surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses, shouting and singing and cheering us on.

She encouraged us to celebrate and cultivate individual gifts that may be difficult to find. She taught us to welcome new ideas and new opinions. She urged us to serve those who so often were unheard or excluded.

Perhaps the greatest lesson I learned from Nella is this: We all bring our gifts and our failings into this work of being the body of Christ, and it takes all of us – even those of us who are very badly broken – to embody something of God's grace in this world.

So now it's our turn to run.

It may be hard.

We may stumble.
We may grow weary.
We may get discouraged, annoyed, or irritated.

Listen then.

Listen to the encouragement from a crowded stadium.
Listen to the voice of those that ran before.
Listen to the great cloud of witnesses.

Listen, then, to Nella, cheering you forward in faith.

We do not run alone.

A great cloud of witnesses surrounds us, giving us a pathway of faith to follow.

Thanks be to God. ■

I have been on the board of a Friendship group for 16 years, and first met Nella when our group celebrated our 30th anniversary in 1998. (Our group, Special Education Ministry of Holland, was used as the model when Friendship Ministries started in 1983.) I've seen first hand the wonderful blessing of people with and without disabilities growing in faith through singing, learning, praying, taking about their faith, and having fun together week after week.

As Executive Director, and only full-time staff person, Nella was administrator, fund raiser, curriculum developer, public speaker, and consultant for the many Friendship groups that minister with some 19,000 people with intellectual disabilities and almost as many mentors. Not only that, Nella served as a tireless advocate for people with disabilities, and did that work with passion, love, and excellence.

She served as an advisor and friend to me in the work I do with Disability Concerns, and she told it like it is. Shortly after I started in July 2006 she initiated a meeting with me in which she told me who I needed to watch out for, who I could trust as a fellow advocate, and who and where I needed to "push." I think that "push" was one of her favorite words. For me, pushing is going to be harder with Nella gone.

But she was a child of God who now knows the riches of unity with Christ Jesus her Lord. She

fought the good fight. She finished the race. She kept the faith. Now she has received the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, awarded to her, and not only to her, but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

I wonder how many people with intellectual disabilities came to know the Lord because Nella worked so hard to share God's love with them through Friendship Ministries. She is celebrating in glory with some of them today. ■

Nella was a veritable fountain of advice on almost every subject. Admittedly, sometimes her advice was unsolicited, but it was almost always good. As spring is coming on, I realize that I will especially miss her wisdom on gardening - she was my most enthusiastic partner for discussing the success and failure of various plants and flowers. "Miracle-Gro" was her suggested remedy for almost everything. Maybe I'll actually try some this year.

She was also an amazing cook. Her microwaved leftovers would fill the office with delicious smells at lunchtime, making my usual bagel sandwich seem rather bland by comparison. She was always happy to share recipes, though, and we spent many hours over the years debating the best way to roast a chicken or arguing about whether you should always add a dollop of apple butter to your butternut squash soup.

Most all, however, Nella was a genuine "people person". She had what my father would have called the "gift of gab", and in her case it truly was a gift. She never had a phone call that lasted less than fifteen minutes (most were much longer), and by the end of a first conversation she would know more about a person than I would have been able to discover in a year. She always knew who should be connected to whom - or if she didn't know, she would find out. No request was unimportant to her, and she would work hard to make sure everyone had the answers they needed. ■

A TRIBUTE FROM THE FRIENDSHIP BOARD

Nella's passing leaves a giant hole in our hearts because she was our friend, our colleague in ministry, and for 17 years our executive director. But she was much more than that, Nella was our prophet and for us the gospel incarnate.

The 56th chapter of Isaiah casts for a vision of a day when "my house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples" (Isaiah 56:7) when the people of the nations will come streaming into the temple and no one will be turned away because of their nationality or because of their disability. Isaiah's vision and Nella's own was that this become a reality. Her constant challenge to congregations was that if the sign on the lawn that read "Everyone Welcome!" were to be true, then they would have to welcome people with disabilities—that a house of prayer for all people cannot simply say that everyone is welcome but that it must break down the barriers that prevent those who love the Lord from fully participating in the life of God's family.

For Friendship, this is what the Kingdom looks like and Nella tirelessly worked to reveal that Kingdom to the world by making it a present reality. I would check in with her from time to time and discover that she had just returned from two speaking engagements in North Carolina, was preparing for a trip to Edmonton, and wondering if she could fit in a trip to California and Florida too. Even as she traveled the country to spread Friendship's vision of the gospel, she kept her heart at her home church of Plymouth Heights. When I brought her down to visit me in



Louisiana to teach a workshop I asked if she might stay over until Sunday to worship with us and her answer was: "Oh no, I need to get back to sit next to Marilyn!"

As a person a little more than half her age, my greatest worry for her was that she would stretch herself too thin and that her limitless enthusiasm would outpace her limited body. But she would not let a little thorn in the flesh impede the spread of the Gospel. Even as she began to struggle with her own limitations in the last few years, she used them for the glory of the Kingdom and reminded us that this is what we are called to do as well. Just a few weeks ago, shortly after her surgery she insisted on teaching a webinar that she had previously scheduled and she said there that the experience of being in a wheelchair during her recovery was giving her a new empathy for her friends in wheelchairs.

That is the Nella I knew and loved—a tireless evangelist for Jesus Christ. We will deeply miss our sister Nella, but as she was the gospel made flesh to us, we know that she will still be with us whenever we make the Good News that was within her the Good News within us as well. ■
